# News & Views



The trees are decorated with frost as if advertising for the coming Christmas celebration. And I have turned my attention to Advent and the new church year. These are precursors to that special moment when we remember the Christ child's birth. In some ways, it feels particularly like a moment we need, that moment of hope reborn, the pinprick of a new

life that lets shine into a world that seems painted with overtones of grays or darker tones. Certainly, the world stage with the wars in Ukraine, in Palestine, and in Somalia as well as other places around the globe brings cries of lament.

So often I hear so many prognostications on how bad things are, or soon will be. Advent, perhaps appropriately, starts with a passage from Mark in which we have a description of the world falling apart. I know we have problems and need to work together to solve our problems, yet, I sometimes wonder where the hype leaves off and the real need for concern and action is appropriate.

What I do know that, in what we now call Palestine, some two thousand years ago, in an unannounced and unnoticed (except for a few shepherds and his family) time and place, a baby was born. And this baby was, in a real way, our God at work bring healing to our world. This act of incredible grace, this incarnation, was unnoticed at the time. Not until some 30 or so years later did the folks of this era notice something new was a foot amongst them. So, I sometimes wonder what seemingly unassuming act God is prompting that will have healing influence on today's world. What I do know is that our opportunity to reflect on and remember what has come of this birth so long ago still has healing qualities.

So, as we prepare to celebrate God's love come among us in Christ, we might feel a tension between this act of compassion and the struggle with compassion for one another we have in our world today. Perhaps this tension is valuable in helping us stay awake, in watching for what God might be doing in our time and

place. A time and place where we are invited to prepare for the way God shows up. We too, might look for the angels singing, or the star in the sky, or even attend through devotion see that God enables us experience goodness to brought to life. I don't really expect to have a choir of angels show up or to be able to pick out an especially meaningful star, but I do think God may give us indications that God is at work among us, and God offers new life.

Our decorating, fellowship gatherings, and worship offer us the opportunities to engage this progression to the moment of celebration when we acknowledge God has come, God cares, such that grace shapes and changes our world. So, I invite you to participate in our worship, our fellowship, and ways of caring for one another throughout the season. Events in our lives may lead us to struggle with the expectations of the pre-Christmas season. We also acknowledge that possibility in our Blue Christmas service on Tuesday, December 12 at 7 p.m. If you have experienced loss, or other have other hope degrading experience(s), in this service we acknowledge and lift these to God ask for God's help to see again the surprising gift of redeeming love God offers. The next evening, Dec 13 at 6 p.m. you're invited to a supper fellowship around a Christmas themed dinner of Shepherd's Pie and Angel food cake in fellowship hall at 6 pm.

Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday this year so we will have our last Sunday in Advent morning service as we normally do at 10:30 a.m. December 24. Then we will have a Christmas Eve service of lessons and carols at 7 p.m. Our worship commemorating and celebrating the Christ child's coming so long ago engages us in remembering how our faith is born in our experience of God's love in Christ. This time of commemorating and celebrating, also encourages us to renew our hope and rejoice in this grace given to us.

### Deacons Benevolence for December

The Board of Deacons has designated the December Benevolence for Family Promise of the Palouse. Family Promise is celebrating 10 years of providing shelter and food for local families in need. More than 30 faith communities across the Palouse have united in this effort. Being that place of refuge while families sort out the complications of life is what Family Promise is about, providing unconditional care to our families while they are most vulnerable. Over the past 10 years, Family Promise of the Palouse has sheltered 120 families, including 248 children. Through the Homeless Prevention Program, Family Promise has prevented homelessness for 63 families, including 125 children. The need in our community has increased, and Family Promise is adding more programming to serve an increasing number of families.

All donations to Family Promise of the Palouse are welcome. We hope to make the most of donations again this year by participating in the Avenues for Hope Challenge, which provides matching funds from corporate donors. Last year's matching raised an additional \$22,000 through the support of the Avenues for Hope sponsor, Home Partnership Foundation.

Community Blue Christmas Service

"Comfort, comfort my people", a familiar phrase that we often hear at Christmas time. There are moments in our lives when we need comfort. There are tough times when we yearn for consolation. In the same way the suffering people who looked for the long-awaited Messiah were given a hope-filled image of God in the writings of Isaiah, we also can be comforted by the belief that no matter what happens to us, God will be with us to bring comfort and support.



Christmas can be a time when many of us feel the need for that reassurance and comfort. Perhaps we are grieving over the loss of a loved one, struggling with illness, or feeling lonely or detached for a variety of reasons. We may wonder how we will get through the holidays. A brief reception will follow the service for those who want to gather and share conversation.

Along with providing temporary housing and meals for up to four families in local church facilities, they also work with homeless families in our community to guide them to long-term sustainable housing. Families receive education related to financial literacy, parenting and life skills. With the support of a case-manager, families are guided to employment, health care and housing.
